Number 8:1-12:16

Beha'alotecha | בהעלותך

"When you set up"

The Israelites set out after their long stay in the Sinai desert, but almost immediately there are problems, protests, and complaints. Moses suffers his deepest emotional crisis. He prays to God to die. God tells him to gather seventy elders who will help him with the burdens of leadership. In the last scene of the portion, Moses' own sister and brother speak against him. Miriam is punished. Moses, here described as the humblest of men, prays on her behalf. After a week's wait for Miriam to be healed, the people move on.

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9:15-23 & 11 / "Where are we going, and what's for dinner?"

Verse 23 says that, "at Adonai's order, they camped; and at Adonai's order, they traveled — they did what Adonai had charged them to do through Moshe." This is quite a significant praise of the Israelites. Think about it. The people had to live their lives ready to move the entire nation at a moment's notice, sometimes moving and resting multiple times in a few days. They obediently followed the cloud to every new location, without much complaint about moving. However, regarding food and drink, they complained *often* (Exo. 15, 16, 17; Num. 11, 20) and faced the consequences for it.
