Leviticus 16:21-22

Then Aaron shall lay both of his hands on the head of the live goat, and confess over it all the **iniquities** of the sons of Israel and all their **transgressions** in regard to all their **sins**; and he shall lay them on the head of the goat and send it away into the wilderness by the hand of a man who stands in readiness. Jude 1:8-10

Yet in the same way these men, also by dreaming, defile the flesh, and reject authority, and revile [angelic] majesties. But Michael the archangel, when he disputed with the devil and argued about the body of Moses, did not dare pronounce against him a railing judgment, but said, "The Lord rebuke you!" But these men rail against things which they do not understand; and the things which they know by instinct, like unreasoning animals, by these things they are destroyed.

Zechariah 3:2

Adonai said to Satan, "Adonai rebuke you, Satan! Indeed, Adonai who has chosen Jerusalem rebuke you! Is this not a brand plucked from the fire?"

Question: #3

Genesis 3:5-7 "For God knows that in the day you eat from it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." When the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was desirable to make *one* wise, she took from its fruit and ate and she gave also to her husband with her, and he ate. Then the eyes of both of them were opened, and they knew that they were naked and they sewed fig leaves together and made them—selves loin coverings.

Genesis 21:19 Then God opened her eyes and she saw a well of water and she went and filled the skin with water and gave the lad a drink.

Numbers 22:31 Then Adonai opened the eyes of Balaam, and he saw the angel of Adonai standing in the way with his drawn sword in his hand, and he bowed all the way to the ground.
